PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Happy Spring Everyone!

I hope everyone is staying safe and well.

2020 was a year unlike any other. The challenges and uncertainty brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic had far reaching impacts on everyone and everything in our province. One of the positives that has come from the pandemic is seeing how strong Nova Scotians are when we come together.

The Great Nova Scotia Pick-Me-Up and Adopt-A-Highway programs had a delayed start due to the pandemic and although cleanup data was not able to be captured until registrations opened on June 15th, there was still an incredible impact made by our volunteer groups. We had 495 cleanups take place in the province. These cleanups engaged over 2,900 volunteers for a total of 3,900 hours. 103 kilometers of shoreline and 430 kilometers of roadway have been cleaned by these amazing volunteers. Over 3,000 bags or 60,659 pounds of litter have been removed from our roadways and shorelines.

Thank you to all our volunteers who have spent thousands of hours getting outside and cleaning up communities across our province and doing so in a safe manner following all public health guidelines. Your dedication to keep Nova Scotia clean and free of litter is greatly appreciated by everyone who lives, works, and plays here.

Our litter programs are generously sponsored by Divert NS, Glad and Nova Scotia Environment. Without their continued support, these programs could not be possible. We greatly appreciate this assistance and look forward to making the impact of these programs bigger and better than ever in 2021.

AAH & PMU COMBINED PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Thanks to our sponsors Divert NS and Nova Scotia Environments support, we were pleased to continue offering the PMU program for the second year. Facilitating over 495 cleanups across the province, 31 of which were completed by dedicated AAH groups, we were thrilled with our success and obtained 75 percent of the data back from our cleanups.






Additionally, we tracked the amount of cleanups by season, as well as by region:



It should be noted that although we were not open during the springtime last year, some clean -ups did take place during the spring. A community in Fairview of over 100 households took part in a clean-up each. This data is included in our overall program data.

We saw a decrease in the combined number of cleanups this year, which totaled 495, of which 31 were AAH cleanups. We believe this is primarily due to the late start date, as we would normally open in early spring versus mid-June. Our busiest season for clean-ups is the spring since litter is no longer covered by snow and can be prominently seen. The number of cleanups has ebbed and flowed since 2014 with a peak happening in 2019. The values below is combined PMU and AAH data.
